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## Director's Note January 2025

The school year is moving rapidly along, and it is amazing to see the relationships, the fun, and the growth happening in our classrooms. These are the most essential pieces of what we do, and also the most observable. But there are lots of things going on behind the scenes as well.

For the past year and a half, Jowonio administrators and Board members have been actively engaged in a Strategic Planning process. Through a grant from the Gifford Foundation, we hired Heidi Holtz (Stillwater Consulting) and Natalie Scavone (OMN Consults) to facilitate the process. With their facilitation, and extensive input from staff, families, and community supporters, we took a fearless look at where we have come from, where we are today, and what initiatives we want to prioritize over the next several years.

Through this process, we re-affirmed our commitment to our long-standing mission, to provide model inclusive programs for young children, where diversity is celebrated and all are free to learn and grow. We identified 5 strategic pathways as areas of focus. These are:

**Build Access to Inclusive Education** - feasible ways to expand hours/programs; supporting families with advocacy, and caring for our aging building

**Develop Thought Leadership** - Better define, research, and review effectiveness of our approaches; and expand training and outreach to advance inclusion and our approaches in other settings

**Increase Effective Communication** - Communication and marking of our approaches; Improved internal and family communication; and strengthened Board relations

**Improve Staff Experience** - Enhance compensation and benefits to attract and retain highly qualified staff; optimize staffing structure for improved efficiency and job satisfaction; foster a positive and cohesive culture; and develop leadership pipelines

**Improve Organizational Effectiveness** - Leverage technology and systems; standardize staff operations and expectations; and strengthen people and culture

These are lofty but attainable goals! We are excited about the new energy and possibilities the strategic planning process has created, and look forward to seeing all we will accomplish, and where it will take us. You are an important part of our success, and we truly welcome your questions, concerns, and input.

# POLICY UPDATES

## Summer Program Changes

In order to continuously provide an environment that is conducive to strong relationships and learning and to serve our entire school population, we need to change our program model for the summer of 2025. What you need to know:

- The summer program runs from 7/7/25 until 8/15/25
- ALL classrooms will operate for 2.5 hours a day (8:45-11:15 or 12:00-2:30)
- A wraparound care program is a strong possibility. We are currently working out the details

## Enrollment Policy Update

Effective for the 2026-2027 School year, Jowonio's enrollment policy will change to be equitable and consistent.

What you need to know:

- Jowonio will limit enrollment to preschool aged children only (turning 3 or 4 years old by December 1st).
- Jowonio will no longer enroll children who turn 5 years old before December 1st.

\*This doesn't mean your child must attend kindergarten! There are many wonderful programs that may be a great stepping stone for your child. We're here to help you brainstorm!

Jowonio regularly revisits and updates policies in response to a wide array of stakeholders and concerns. For example, our summer program changes are in response to a nationwide educator shortage which has made it increasingly challenging to maintain our high quality Special Class Inclusive Setting (SCIS) classroom model during the summer months. The decision to switch to half days for summer was made in consultation with Jowonio's school board, some district CPSE staff and with NYS Department of Education. We understand this change is challenging for families and we assure you that we are working diligently to offer some type of wraparound care.

Historically we have had some families continue to enroll their kindergarten eligible kids at Jowonio. However, this option has never been available to kids who receive special education services as part of our SCIS program. UPK programming also cannot be extended to a child's kindergarten eligible year. Updating this policy creates an equitable enrollment policy allowing for equal access regardless of disability or program status. Additionally, Jowonio is a preschool program. Enrolling only preschool aged students supports our mission of providing a high quality preschool program to three and four year olds.

In recent month's Jowonio's Therapy team has developed our school's cohesive eating philosophy. We are happy to share it with you all here:

## Eating Philosophy and Mission Statement

At Jowonio School, we are committed to creating a nurturing and inclusive environment where every child can thrive. Our eating philosophy is rooted in neurodiverse affirming practices and ensuring that each child's unique needs and preferences are respected and celebrated. By following the child's lead, prioritizing their safety and wellbeing, and encouraging the exploration of food in all its diverse forms, we aim to foster a positive and enriching eating experience.

At Jowonio:

We Acknowledge that

- every child and family has a unique relationship with food, influenced by their diverse cultural backgrounds
- eating challenges affect the whole family unit
- all parents and caregivers are doing their best and have the best intentions for their children
- eating may not be a pleasurable experience for everyone, but hope that mealtimes can become neutral or positive, nurturing social experiences

We Believe

- in a low pressure/no pressure environment when trying new foods
- there are no "good" or "bad" foods; instead, we focus on what each food does for the body
- food is part of our curriculum, we encourage activities and exposure regularly around new foods
- mealtimes are an opportunity to grow and foster social skills, we support and encourage interactions regularly
- the focus of eating therapy is improving the child's quality of life, not to meet cultural or developmental norms that may not be appropriate for that child

Our Staff

- seek to understand why a child is struggling with eating and explore the underlying factors
- build our practice and make decisions based on what is safe and comfortable for the child
- advocate for unrestricted access to a child's safe foods, believing that with exposure and practice, children may choose to incorporate new foods into their diet
- uphold a child's right to say "no" and eat foods in the order they choose
- incorporate play into the eating experience in order to help children explore new foods in a multisensory way
- provide positive experiences around food, even if that doesn't involve eating them
- know making a mess is part of learning to eat, and we encouraging learning to clean-up
- try to involve kids in all the steps of the meal process; planting, cooking, and preparing food
- purposely empower children to learn how to problem solve foods





# IT'S HERE: WINTER WEATHER!

Check your Remind app! Any delay or closure for Jowonio will be sent out via the Remind app and posted on regional news station Closure Lists as "Jowonio" or "Jowonio School".

Important Bus Info! Buses cannot transport children into or through a closed school district even if Jowonio itself is open. For example: if your home school district is closed or delayed, bussing to Jowonio will be canceled or delayed accordingly. If Jowonio is open, parents and caregivers are welcome to transport the child to school themselves.

In the event of a 2-hour delay, there will be no school for the Bunny or Kangaroo classrooms.

In the event of a two hour delay on a Wednesday, the school will be open for children from 10:30-12:30, but no bussing will be provided.

### Myth: Can You Catch a Cold From the Cold? by Nurse Jamie

Many people believe that cold weather directly causes colds, but this isn't entirely accurate. The common cold is caused by viruses, not by cold temperatures themselves. However, cold weather can contribute to conditions that make us more susceptible to catching a cold.

When the weather turns colder, people tend to spend more time indoors in close proximity to others. This increases the chances of being exposed to cold-causing viruses, such as rhinoviruses, which spread easily through droplets from coughing, sneezing, or touching contaminated surfaces.

Additionally, cold, dry air can dry out the mucous membranes in the nose and throat, making it easier for viruses to enter the body. Moreover, the immune system may not function as efficiently in colder temperatures, which could also make you more vulnerable.

While staying indoors during colder months may seem cozy, it's important to remember the benefits of fresh air. Ventilating your home by opening windows, even for short periods, helps reduce the concentration of airborne viruses and improves overall air quality. Fresh air also promotes better circulation and can support a healthy immune system, reducing the likelihood of getting sick.

To minimize the risk of catching a cold in cold weather, it's important to practice good hygiene, such as washing hands regularly, avoiding close contact with sick individuals, and dressing warmly to protect your body from the elements.

Helping a dozen or more preschoolers into their snow clothes is no easy feat! Jowonio teachers work hard to support kids develop self help skills and independence for this task along with many others. Classrooms will often read books like, "Froggy Get's Dressed" or "The Jacket I Wear in the Snow", and engage in various activities to learn about getting oneself dressed and ready to play. Sometimes visuals, like the one below, can be a helpful tool that promotes independence and provides instructions for kids. Families may want to try something similar. 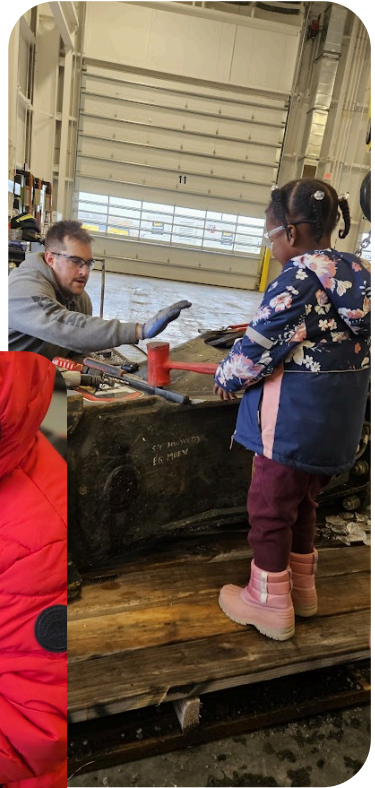
If all else fails, bring the snow in! Waterfall kids loved playing with watercolor droppers and snow in the classroom on a recent cold day!

Sunflower kids visited the Minoa Fire Department thanks to a parent who arranged it!



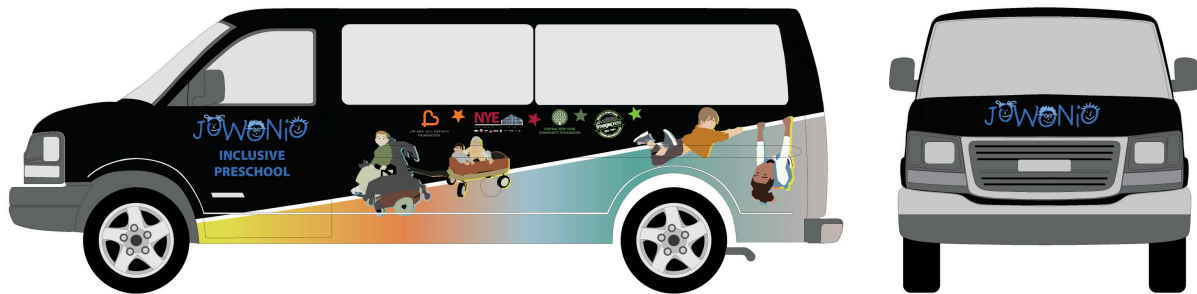

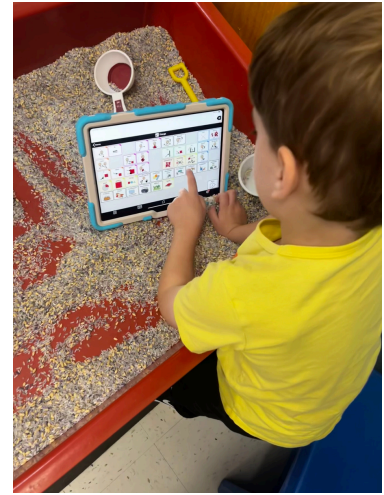

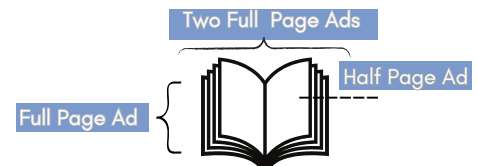
